Every spring across America wildland firefighters train and prepare for the upcoming fire season. Fire crews consist of 18-20 men and women whose main responsibility is to dig fire lines, preventing the spread of fire. They also start controlled fires, robbing the main blaze of required fuel, as well as clean up smoldering areas once a fire is extinguished. Their typical work day on a wildfire may include waking up at sunrise, preparing a 25-pound backpack and tools, hiking several miles into the fire zone, and digging fire line for 12 hours or more.
